THROCKMORTON-RISER FOUNDATION INVESTS IN THE FUTURE OF CREST USD 479

The Crest USD 479 School District is experiencing transformation, thanks in large part to the generous support of the Throckmorton-Riser Foundation. With a steadfast commitment to empowering students and strengthening educational opportunities, the Foundation has become a vital partner in the district's mission to prepare learners for success in both college and careers.

The Throckmorton-Riser Foundation, Inc. was founded on December 18, 1990 by Alma K. (Riser) Throckmorton and her late husband, Warren E. Throckmorton, as a not-for-profit charitable organization to provide scholarships for high school graduates from the Anderson County, Kansas area to help pay for their college education. The Throckmortons moved from Hoisington to Garnett, Kansas in 1972. She taught elementary school for 16 years before she retired. She was a member of the United Methodist Church in Garnett and participated in many civic organizations based in Hoisington and Garnett. Mrs. Throckmorton passed away on Tuesday, October 30, 2001 at the Garnett Nursing Home at the age of 96. Mr. Throckmorton was an active member in the United Methodist Church at Garnett, the Masonic Lodge, the local Garnett radio club, and he retired from the Missouri Pacific Railroad. Mr. Throckmorton died on Friday, June 28, 1985 at the Anderson County Hospital at the age of 80. Wayne A. Riser, Mrs. Throckmorton's brother, was a letter carrier out of Garnett, Kansas Post Office for 42 years until he retired in 1969. Through Last Will & Testament Wayne Riser, and Alma Throckmorton left bequests to multiple causes near and dear to their hearts in the regional area as well as directing the balance of the estate to create the Throckmorton-**Riser Foundation.**

The Foundation started with several \$1,000 scholarships for local students and the occasional donation towards school equipment. The initial Trustees were Mrs. Throckmorton, Fred Mitchelson of the Wheeler & Mitchelson Law Firm, and Kenneth L. Weide of the Garnett State Savings Bank. Today the Foundation provides over \$30,000 a semester to over twenty scholarship recipients and has expanded efforts to support the communities and schools in Anderson County. Today the Foundation is guided by John Mitchelson and Kevin Mitchelson of Wheeler & Mitchelson Law Firm as well as Dwight Nelson of Goppert State Service Bank (retired).

The Foundation's financial contributions are wide-reaching and deeply impactful to Crest USD 479. One of the most significant investments has been in the district's Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs for our students. By covering student tuition costs for automotive, welding, HVAC, and nursing coursework, the Throckmorton-Riser Foundation ensures that Crest students have direct access to valuable hands-on training and certification opportunities—without the barrier of financial strain. This support is helping shape a skilled, workforce-ready Lancer student body. The Foundation knows that not all students want to go to a four year institution. The Throckmorton-Riser Foundation has always shown passion for the trades and kids that know how to work hard!

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In addition to academic programming, the Foundation has funded several critical infrastructure projects across the district. The Foundation funded the construction of a new softball field at Colony City Park. Inside the school, students benefit from a newly updated computer lab. Safety improvements have also been prioritized, with new controlled entry improvements and intercom upgrades designed to keep students and staff secure. The Foundation also provided the funds necessary to remodel our weight room and provide safer equipment in that space.

For Crest seniors, the Foundation provides scholarships to help pave the way toward higher education, lightening the financial burden of college and reinforcing the value of continued learning.

Looking ahead, the Throckmorton-Riser Foundation has pledged to donate \$200,000 over the next three fiscal years to support capital improvements to CTE classroom spaces that coincide with bond and other capital projects. This long-term commitment underscores the Foundation's belief in the importance of investment in education and job-readiness programs.

The impact of the Throckmorton-Riser Foundation on the Crest USD 479 as well as Garnett USD 365 is both immediate and lasting. Their dedication to educational excellence is building stronger classrooms, a safer campus, and a brighter future for every student in Anderson County. We feel it is extremely important for our patrons to understand the work the Throckmorton-Riser Foundation is doing in our school district.

School Supplies

PRESCHOOL (3 & 4-year-old): – Small pencil box with snap lid, glue sticks,1 set of Crayola watercolor paints, Crayola crayons, 3 containers of Playdoh, 1 tissue box, & regular size backpack (holds a 9.5 X 12 folder)

KINDERGARTEN: Small plastic school box with a snap lid, 24 pack crayons, 6 glue sticks, 1 bottle of Elmer's school glue, 2 boxes of tissues, gym shoes, paint shirt, backpack

FIRST GRADE: #2 pencils, 1 box of 24 crayons, 2 boxes of tissues, gym shoes, 6 glue sticks, school scissors (Fiskars brand), 4 big pink pearl erasers, pencil box, 2 pocket folders, Clorox wipes, book bag (no wheels)

All students in MS and HS participating in fall sports are required to have their sport physical before they can begin practicing. Without a physical on file, they will not be allowed to practice.
